

Where Boots Go to Die - submitted by: Joe Pettie

“Where boots go to die” is a favorite saying among Appalachian Trail Thru-hikers. It is the best way to describe what it is like to hike the northeastern part of Pennsylvania. Rocky is an understatement. Instead of fields of grain, the AT hosts mountain trails of rocks which look like giant toy building blocks dumped and forgotten. For most of 100 miles, there is not a path of ground or dirt, just loose rocks the size of soccer balls to large model cars, stacked on top of each other.



June 2022 is when my trusty pair of hiking boots succumbed to the phase “where boots go to die”. My boots and I have hiked over 1000 trail miles together, but when we traversed the northeastern part of Pennsylvania and southern part of New York we met our match.

This year I started my two-week trip with the goal to finish hiking the parts of the AT that I missed on previous hikes. I planned on hiking the remaining parts of Connecticut, New York, and Pennsylvania. A total of 191 miles. On June 4th, my son-in-law and grandson dropped me off near Cornwall Bridge, Connecticut. From there I hiked south. I soon realized what it was going to be like for the remainder of my journey. Covid 19 even affected the Appalachian Trail.

Since the AT is maintained by volunteers, the trail suffered from Covid 19 not allowing the maintenance to be performed. The trail was poorly marked and most of the white blazes were very faded. In years past, a blaze mark could be found about every 100 feet. On this trip there were times when I would hike for 15 minutes before finding a faded one. There were a few times when I lost the trail and spent hours trying to find my way back.

Another reason for the lack of blazes was that a majority of marked trees were ash trees which are being wiped out due to the ash borer beetle. There were several ash groves devastated by the borer. For as far as you could see there were groves of ash trees standing like dead sentries waiting to fall over.

Upper New York proved to be very exhausting. My pack weighed 42 pounds. The rocks were brutal. I had to re-hike 4 miles because I got turned around. In New York you cannot set up camp wherever. You must stay at designated areas which could be more than 20 miles apart. In addition, there were some areas that were closed due to high aggressive bear activity. There were times I hiked 16 hours straight.

With just 31 miles left, I had to abandon my goal of finishing New York due to sheer exhaustion. My sister and brother-in-law came to my rescue. To get to where they could pick me up, I had to walk across the mile long bridge over the Hudson River. The winds were so strong I had to hold tightly onto the railing to avoid being thrown into the traffic. They took me to dinner where I consumed 3 people's worth of food. Then, we drove to Pennsylvania. We stayed at a hotel.

The next morning with a belly full of delicious breakfast, I started hiking the portion of the Pennsylvania AT I had not hiked yet. This was the portion of the AT that my faithful boots were on their "last leg". How many ways can one describe rocky? My wife keeps a record of my comments as I report in. Adjectives I used were Rocky Mountain Horror Show, grueling, Holy xxxxx, and so on. Oh, and let us not leave out trying to find a flat spot to set up my tent in the pouring rain.

One of the nice things about hiking the AT is meeting hikers along the way. This trip I met two gentlemen whose trail names were Geezer 1 and Geezer 2. Ages 70 and 61. They were from Connecticut and were yearly section hikers. Both were over 6 feet tall. Even though I have hiked with thru hikers in their 20's and easily kept up, my little legs were pushed to their limit keeping up with the Geezer's long legs. Exhausting as it was, I really enjoyed the company.


I was very fortunate to be hiking the area of the trail where the northbound thru-hikers were. This meant that "trail magic" was great. On several occasions, I met people who set up grills along the trail to cook free food for thru and section hikers. I was stuffed with 3 hot dogs, home cooked brownies, chips, and Gatorade by two charming ladies in their 30's who give out food every year. A half mile away I realized I left my hat, and I went back to the ladies. They gave me more Gatorades and brownies. I must have looked too thin.

At another location, I had 2 cheeseburgers with all the fixings, candy bars, fresh fruit, chips, and drinks from a man and his son. The son had been thru-hiking, but two weeks in, he severely injured his ankle and couldn't continue. So, they decided to do trail magic with the supplies that the son would not need anymore.

In my previous newsletters I have described the challenges of hiking the AT. Things like hiking in the rain, steep cliffs to climb and traverse down, rattlesnakes to sneak around, and lack of cell service and then a panicked wife when she could not reach me to let me know there was a severe storm coming, etc. This trip I crossed paths with a lynx. At 10 yards away, he was extremely unhappy about sharing the trail. We eyed each other for quite a while, both of us trying to figure out what to do next. Lynx and humans do not mix. At last, he yielded, and we were both on our way. I still think his growl sounded like he was grumbling about the whole ordeal.

Fun facts, do you know the difference between a bobcat and a lynx? My wife drew these for you to compare.

The Canadian Lynx is on the left and the bobcat is on the right. The Canadian Lynx has tufts on its ears and a shaggy mane of fur around its cheeks. It weighs 25 lbs., height 21", and has a length of 36". It has



hair on its feet and spreads its large paws out to use as snowshoes on fluffy snow. Its legs are longer than a bobcat.

A bobcat looks more like a domesticated cat. It weighs 21 lbs., height 18", and has a length of 33". Both the lynx and bobcat have short, rounded tails. The bobcat's tail is banded with black stripes with black at the top and white at the bottom. A Lynx's tail lacks banding and is completely black at the tip.

The lynx was large enough, but the bigger beast that I would face was getting Lyme Disease. While on the trail I tried to remove the numerous deer ticks on me but found 4 more after arriving home. I lost a lot of weight and was so exhausted. After arriving home early, I slept for days and still was weak. Weeks went by and I still felt tired all the time. At 6 weeks I developed 6-10" red blotches all over my body and was tested for Lyme Disease. A few days later I contracted Bell's Palsy which can be a neurological side effect of Lyme Disease. I am very fortunate that the antibiotics put the Lyme Disease in remission. With the aid of steroids and exercises my wife helped me do, I regained control of the left side of my face.

Despite the challenges I faced this trip I did manage to hike 160 miles. Other than 31 miles I missed in New York, I have hiked part of Vermont and Virginia, and hiked all of Connecticut, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, and West Virginia. My new boots and I hope to go back to New York and hike the 31 miles to complete that state.

Barred Owl

I live out in the country, so we see a lot of wildlife our way. My wife, Chris, and I try to walk regularly on our road which is nothing but country everywhere. The past summer she spotted an owl in the woods, so I got a photo of it. Owls normally come out at night, so it is always a treat to see in the daytime. We hear them hoot at night and then another one far away hoots back. I guess hoot is the correct term – at least it is the country term we use. I have a tree near our house, and I remember years ago it was hooting from that tree, and it was a little eerie hearing that close – they are louder than you think when closer.

A couple tidbits about the barred owl;

They have 2 large wings allowing them to fly as slow as 2 MPH gliding noiselessly with little flapping.

Barred owls got their name because of the vertical bars and horizontal bars on their abdomen and chest. Very obvious from my photo I took above.

Their eyes are tube-shaped, like binoculars, giving them excellent depth perception and large eyes to help more light get in during the night.

Barred owls have excellent hearing and have asymmetrical ears to triangulate sound. One ear is located higher on the head and the other lower. This helps them hear their preys' precise location.

They have a terrible sense of smell.

Owls are more flexible in the head because a bird's head is only connected by one socket, where humans have two sockets. Owls have multiple vertebrae, the small bones that make up the neck and spine, helping them achieve a wide range of motion.







BSD Grand Opening

On November 3, 2022, Building Supply of Delmarva (BSD) held a grand opening of their new showroom and office with a ribbon cutting event.


The Taney Corporation designed and provided the stairs and associated handrails in the new showroom. Taney also designed and provided new Taney Stair wall displays.
